# **Holy Trinity Mission Initiative**

The church has always had a passion for doing what it can to change the lives of those less fortunate and at Holy Trinity we are spending the year promoting toilet twinning.



Because the school had no toilets the surrounding area becomes pretty gross and girls in particular drop out of school...no toilet, nowhere to change or wash during their periods.

It could not be simpler. For £60 you 'twin' your toilet with a latrine built overseas thus giving families dignity, better hygiene and often the chance of education. We transform lives for such a small sum.

Any twinned toilet receives a certificate with a picture of the twinned loo and the GPS co-ordinate of where in the world it is. This can be done on-line (toilettwinning.org) or I have a supply of certificates at church. You can choose your country and loo.

I have a hope that Sunningdale will become a toilet twinned village – it depends if we twin enough toilets. Already church members have raised the money to twin the toilets in the Nags Head and the Hope Centre and I've promoted the idea at Charters – we shall see what comes of that.

It's not an idea everyone will respond to...I've discovered just how many charities and causes Sunningdale people champion and it shows what a compassionate people we are. However, the invitation is there and if you would like to know more, pop into church during the week or email me at <u>htsvicar@gmail.com</u>

At Charters I shared with the students the story of Bridget who is 14. She lives in Uganda. At her school a group of students would be chosen each day to go and collect water. At Charters, a tutor group is responsible for setting out the chairs for assembly. How would they feel to miss a couple of lessons, walk back to Sunningdale and haul water to the school? And how would they feel knowing the water is infected because the source is an area that families use as a toilet.

But at Bridget's school they now have a small toilet block and a changing room and running water. No need to fetch infected water and dignity for the girls in particular. After the block was completed and the word spread about, 65 girls re-enrolled at school and are getting their education. Lives changed for the better. What's not to like about that?

I won't be offended if folk have other charitable priorities, but the invitation is there...consider twinning your toilet and (to quote the toilet twinning website) help flush away poverty one toilet at a time.

Thus far church members have twinned their own toilets, raised money to twin toilets at places we frequent and bought twin certificates as gifts for family members. What do you buy for someone who has everything? Twin their loo! Over the coming year I will see if I can visit various locations, businesses, centres, pubs and restaurants and invite them to consider ways of raising the sum and twinning their facilities, if they would like to.

Perhaps there's somewhere you enjoy going and might consider asking if you could raise the funds and twin their loo. Ask gently...it's not a demand, just a request.

We'll never know how many lives we change, the reduction in disease, the people who can work because they are not ill, the children who can study because they are not ashamed to go to school. Perhaps that's the best part of it...genuine compassion, offered freely with no expectation of recognition. Not only will Sunningdale be a toilet twinned village, we'll have "loved our neighbour as ourselves".

That brings a flush of pleasure. (sorry – couldn't resist).

Gross! But it gets worse.

# What do you believe? Confirmation

During Lent in 2019 I'll be holding preparation classes for anyone wishing to explore their faith and get confirmed.

Following the announcement that Andrew, Bishop of Reading is to retire at Easter, we will be attending the **Easter Eve Confirmation at Reading Minster** (Saturday 20 April), his last as a serving Bishop. The service is at 7:30 pm.

The preparation classes are for anyone wishing to explore their faith. It doesn't automatically follow that attendance will be followed by confirmation, some may feel they wish to go on considering at a deeper level.

The classes for those aged over 11 and under 18 will be on Thursday evenings at 6 pm for 1 hour : **March 14, 21, 28**.

For adults, 7.30 pm on Tuesday evenings : **March 12, 19, 26**.

In times past confirmation was expected before receiving communion, but the church relaxed its stance some years ago admitting children to communion after local preparation. Although the expectation of confirmation by 11 years old (or soon after) remains, I would encourage parents not to feel under any pressure.

Baptism is the more important step, with confirmation being the service where individuals "confirm" the promises made by them, or for them, at baptism. Allowing young people to reach that age of critical reasoning and deeper inquiry will give them the opportunity to make a reasoned and clear decision about their faith and a desire to be publicly confirmed.

# Who are you?

The Disney cartoon of *Alice in Wonderland* has a scene where Alice meets a large caterpillar. Blowing letters out in colourful smoke he asks a number of times "Who R U?" The truthful Alice replies "Well I hardly know sir, I've changed so many times since this morning. I cannot explain myself, because I am not myself".

Many of us will have done a personality exercise, be it a tongue in cheek quiz from a magazine or something more serious your line-manager can use at work. Myers Briggs was a favourite at the Building Society where I worked, but I already knew I was an E for extrovert; no surprises there.

My home grown personality typing is an update of an ancient system. Combining the four temperaments (*borrowed from the Greek physician Hippocrates 460-370BC*) with the lead characters in the Wind in the Willows provides a very useful system. Perhaps I should patent it? Mr Toad is Sanguine, Mole is Phlegmatic, Badger Melancholic and the Water Rat Choleric. It's easy to remember but I have been known to refer to someone as a typical Rat, which can be misconstrued. (*Google "the four temperaments" to read the original system*).

The danger with any personality typing is that having spotted some correlation with who you think you are, you tend to try and fit yourself into the rest of the typical characteristics. Ultimately, we are far more complex and wonderful than any description or type.

Recently my wife and I shared a retreat at Launde Abbey where the Enneagram shone a light to give greater understanding on the "Who R U?" question. This ancient system is not owned or promoted by any specific ethnic or faith group and is best described as a mirror to show you yourself, rather than tell you who you are. It asks different questions to the run of the mill personality type programme. It asks how you became the person you are? What is it you experienced that led you to



be shaped as you are and make sense of survival in the world? I've already said enough for you to grasp that it has the potential to ask the very deepest questions. During the retreat week I observed that one or two seemed to have an existential crisis, they weren't who they thought they were; but by the end it would appear everyone seemed to be accommodating the revelations.

In the Disney film Alice is also having an existential crisis. So much has happened since she fell down the rabbit hole that she no longer knew or trusted anything about herself. The wonderful irony is that she is being questioned by a caterpillar who is most definitely not himself. As the scene progresses he disappears and of course a butterfly has emerged.

In Isaiah 43:1 it says *"Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have summoned you by name; you are mine".* Throughout my week thinking about who I am, I was held fast by the knowledge of whose I was. Although there may be parts of me I really don't like, (or maybe – I'm learning to love) I did so in the knowledge that I am loved by God. I am His.

Augustine said *"we are restless until we find our rest in Thee"* and I can't argue with that, largely because I have found it to be true. Whatever I'm like, I'm made for a relationship with God and it's only in the context of His love I can truly become my real self.
