Transforming Trinity - One step at a time

One of the aspects that attracted me to Holy Trinity as the next Vicar was the desire to be a centre for both church and community. That hope is tempered somewhat by the restricted space and the nature of a classic Victorian Church.

Sunningdale residents will recall how extensive the church and community activity became when the church had the use of the CMI building on Church Road. Plans were drawn up to refurbish and extend Holy Trinity to create the space needed when the CMI passed on to other use. (It's now occupied by Dreamcatchers Nursery).

When the plans were first published in September 2014 as The Heritage Project, the idea of doing everything, all in one go, appears to have been a key reason development didn't progress beyond planning permission.

The need though has not diminished; neither the practical needs (for example the sub-floor is failing in places) or the development of additional space. The key is to re-visit the plans and review what might be done and how it might be phased.

The PCC has no desire to re-do all of the research and broadly accepts the conclusions of the feasibility study previously undertaken and approved by the Diocese. There is though scope to consider details and aspects of the 'preferred option'. The PCC have recruited an independent consultant to review and comment on the plans, to advise how to phase the work, and to offer alternative solutions for discussion.

We hope to be able to come to a decision at our PCC away-day in May on what the priorities are and where best to begin.

Uppermost in mind is the beauty of the church and the special place it holds in the affections of so many people. When a church has been the location of baptisms, weddings and funerals; of school services and Christmas concerts, of Remembrance



services and Harvest celebrations, thoughts of how it might change can be unsettling.

But I'm not sure anyone will object to being warmer, or to improved lighting, or to having a place with additional facilities so that it can be enjoyed more. I shall no doubt have very detailed discussion with the Victorian Society, but I will argue my case that maintaining the church's character does not extend to being cold! Some steps to Transforming Trinity are very small, are uncontroversial and prove to be most helpful.

The current heating solution doesn't cover the area of the choir. I was sitting quietly in the sanctuary one day (that's the other side of the altar rail) and realised that the heaters in the choir pews were still there.

An electrician doing a couple of small jobs investigated and the original wiring was in place. A fix or two later and the heating was restored. Morning prayer, the monthly prayer meeting and the Ash Wednesday service were all conducted with lovely warm feet and knees.

Not everything will be quite so simple or inexpensive...but we'll get there. One step at a time.



Our year got off to a fantastic start with the construction of our new 'Spiritual Garden' in the playground. The garden provides a pleasant spot for reflection and for children who like to sit

and chat at playtime. The winter bulbs are starting to bloom and we're looking forward to our summer planting. The garden was conceived by our School Council and designed by Sebastian Jans, a garden designer and parent at the school, with contributions from the PTA and the community including the 4Women team at Holy Trinity Church. We're really grateful to everyone who helped to turn the children's idea into reality!

We're also really delighted to have received a letter this term from Damian Hinds, the Secretary of State for Education, congratulating us on the very high standard of achievement in Maths in our Key Stage 2 assessments last year. Our results for 2017/18 put us in the top 1% of primary schools in England for maths. Our superb Year 6 class achieved 100% pass rate in both Maths and Grammar and 97% in Reading.

We try hard to balance academic work demanded by the national curriculum with fun and practical learning activities and interesting trips. Year 5 have just completed four days of Bikeability training (you may have seen them in Hi-Viz on the streets of Sunningdale!) The children have enjoyed numerous trips including visits to the theatre, Rushall Farm, Winchester Science Centre, **Brookwood Military Cemetery and Harry** Potter World to name but a few. Years 5 and 6 also have residential trips to look forward to. Year 5 will be travelling to the Jurassic Coast in Dorset in June and Year 6 will be spending five days at the fabulous Mill on the Brue activity centre in July! Thank you to all of our supporters and volunteers (especially our Governor team) who help to make our school a great place to be.

As their voices blend their hopes for a big score are laid bare and they think they have the inside information for a guaranteed win. That word guarantee. I shiver.

Many years ago I worked in financial services and during the time I was training there was a scandal. Is that a surprise?

A product had folded leaving investors facing big losses, made all the worse because the product was marketed as low risk and had the magic word "guarantee" when it came to the capital.

I asked if any of our investors had been sold the product and the head broker told me that he had been offered it, but it had a whiff about it. I asked for more and he simply said...if the best anyone can do is 11% interest and they all offer 11% interest...you have to question 13%. (You can tell how long ago this was). His reasoning made sense.

I've been out of the industry a long long time, but I did read of something similar happening recently. I'm not criticising investors looking for safe, looking for a guarantee, being shown a product that ticks all the boxes. I remember Equitable Life.

It wasn't sold through brokerages like ours so it was highly annoying to lose out as teachers, lawyers, doctors, the police and probation service purchased a product that had a guarantee. My Uncle invested with them too.

He was a smart guy. When he came to retire he sold his commercial building business as a buyout to his senior management. He sold his waste dump land to a development corporation. He came unstuck on one of his pensions. He told me he bought it because of the guarantee.

As it says in Ecclesiastes, what's been round, comes round and there's nothing new under the sun.

I do use the word guarantee myself at weddings. I tell the couple that I would love the certificate I give them to be a guarantee but sadly it's not. I would love them to experience better, richer, health but they might experience worse, poorer, sickness.

I do advise though that there is a guarantee on offer and to be fair, you don't need to be getting married to access it.

God's promises. What he says he will do, he will do, guaranteed. It's a deal sealed in blood after all. I know it to be true because I test it out regularly and He's never let me down. You may want to take that up with me and I'm always happy to discuss. Get in touch htts://docs.py.new.org/

Holy Trinity is a Fairtrade church, which helps make a real difference to the lives of farmers and workers in developing countries. Fairtrade, defined simply, is when

producers are paid a fair price for their work, so they can afford life's essentials - like housing, food, education and healthcare.

The tea and coffee we serve in church is fairly traded and since 1998 we have had a Traidcraft stall selling Fairtrade products. Traidcraft's mission is to fight poverty through trade, to help people in developing countries transform their lives. Their vision is for a world freed from poverty, where trade is just, and people and communities can flourish.

Our Traidcraft stall in church is run by a group of volunteers and operates most Sundays during the coffee break, selling fairly traded items such as chocolate, biscuits, tea and coffee. At Easter and Christmas we sell the fair trade Easter Eggs and Advent calendars.

1st Sunningdale Scout Group



We were formed in 1910, three years after Scouting was started by Robert Baden-Powell so we are one of the oldest Scout Groups in the area.

Currently we have 23 Beavers (aged 6 to 8), 23 Cubs (aged 8 to 10 $\frac{1}{2}$), 34 Scouts (10 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 14) and 14 Explorers (14 to 18), consisting of both boys and girls.

The popularity of Scouting is totally down to the time, creativity and enthusiasm of our leaders and the Executive Committee, all of whom are volunteers.

What do we do? If you were ever a Scout it is still very much the same, Cubs still do the Shout. Camps are a key feature. Last year we had a District Camp at a site near Watford. It was a very hot weekend, so the main focus was keeping all the youngsters hydrated. Activities included throwing chickens (rubber ones), making woggles and we were all pirates for the weekend 'Aye'!

Beavers attended the Harvest Festival Service, went to see a Hansel and Gretel panto and #had a bring a pet session, all of which go towards their badges. They have built shelters, hid from the leaders in Swinley Forest and pond dipped looking for creepy crawlies.

Cubs slept at Henley Fort, Guildford, which was used as a look out during the Second World War. We all dressed up as the Home Guard and soldiers, and learnt what life was like for those billeted there. Cubs took part in the Berkshire Dragon Boat Regatta, where they got through to the semi finals. They have built fires and toasted marshmallows. Cubs put in two wheelbarrows for the Sunninghill wheelbarrow race: the Camouflage Cubs and Clowning Around. They are also looking forward to sleeping on HMS Belfast.

Scouts did a BBQ at Charters Summer Fair, where they met HRH The Duke of Kent, and ran a BBQ stall at the Sunninghill Fair where they sold 200 hot dogs and 120 burgers.

One night of the year all Scouts around the world take to the airwaves making contact with each other. Our Scouts took part via broadband and then slept in the Scout HQ overnight. Scouts built the impressive beacon in Broomhall to celebrate the 'Battles Over' event. Adam Afriyie MP paid the Scouts a visit to talk about current topics, including Brexit.

In January, the Scouts and Explorers went on their annual Winter Camp at Gillwell in Essex, where they had a cold but great time.

Explorer Scouts went caving and climbing in the Mendips. I cannot believe how narrow it was in places and how steep it was; the climbing was on a slate rock face. We stayed in a Caving Hut (a house used by cavers with lots of caving memorabilia). They went on a wild camp expedition to the Lake District, Great End on Sprinkling Tarn, and Langdale.

Cubs, Scouts and Explorers took part in the Remembrance Day Service, always a great honour.

Every quarter we hold a Jumble Sale at our HQ in Sandy Lane. Not only is this a great source of income, but we provide a recycling service and donate left over jumble to local charities and Thames Valley Hospice.

We also sell second hand bikes, another recycling opportunity we provide. Bikes are donated, we repair them as required and check roadworthiness. We will be selling bikes again at the Holy Trinity Summer Festival. We have become so successful we now have bike storage issues!

Every two years we hold a Ball. This year it is at Windlesham Golf Club on Saturday 18th May. The Ball, which is open to all, raises valuable funds for our Scout Group, through ticket sales and auctions. You are welcome to join us or, if you are able, to provide an auction item.

None of this is possible without volunteers. We need more adults to help run the sections. You don't need experience, just enthusiasm. If you would like to find out more about being involved please do get in touch.
