



Transforming Trinity draws nigh!



From time to time I wonder what life will be like after the Transforming Trinity project is complete. As and when the things we've been working towards all these years have been accomplished...what then? I start to think about all that we shall be able to do that much more easily because the space is there to do them.

In the meantime, the work goes on and the burden has shifted to our design team of specialists and the ongoing dialogue between our professionals and the Diocesan Advisory Council (DAC) and their professionals. There's no end to what they want to know, but the end result of all that is a design that is

appropriate for our heritage building. We have also applied for planning permission from the Borough who give permission for anything external that will impact the parish church.

This includes the three solar panel arrays, a new door in the west end of church and fitting automatic glass sliding doors just outside the existing oak porch doors to help with heat retention. These specific items can be seen in the film clip on our website that explains the whole project. (www.holytrinitysunningdale.co.uk/transforming-trinity/ and click on link to the video clip).

We also plan to have three air source heat pumps (masked from view by fencing) a terraced area outside the west end, re-order the driveway and have an EV charger and bike racks (the charger being a Borough requirement).

All in all the exterior of the building won't change a great deal and the most popular view of the church (for example the one shown here) will be unchanged. One part of one of the solar panel arrays will be visible, this photograph shows where that will be.

There is still a long process to work through and the timescale is not in our hands, that is decided by the DAC. At some point there will be another 28 day consultation period, similar to the one the Borough had, but this time asking for comments and input on the whole scheme (exterior and interior) and this time the comments go to the legal department of the Diocese.

For any neighbours who think the road to getting alterations done is a tricky one juggling

architects, planning and builders; just imagine doubling it and then adding in the Victorian Society, Historic England and the Church Building Council!

But we are moving steadily towards the time when the work can begin, which we hope to be June 2025. Our focus is on the fund-raising and now is the time for pledges to be fulfilled and grants to be received. Because of how the church is to be remodelled, we are planning to move the existing WW1 plaque from the back wall in the north corner to a more prominent place in the choir. It would be very special to have a new one alongside recording all the WW2 names and others lost in conflict since then.

We are researching manufacturers to choose someone who will meet our requirements, and an indicative cost thus far is £1,800.

Holy Trinity School

This term we have been looking at our value of Forgiveness and began by reflecting on some of Jesus' words in the 'Sermon on the Mount', containing the statements known as the 'Beatitudes' or How to Bee... (attitudes). We try to follow the Bee in our 4 school rules. Be Respectful, Be Responsible, Be Kind, Be Safe! How to Bee attitudes sets out the topsy-turvy manifesto of God's Kingdom. We reflected on how these ideas might help to shape our school community life in the way that we try to treat each other. The How to Bee (attitudes) also lined up with significant calendar events in this term, such as Harvest and Remembrance and how we should share with others, remembering those who have died in the wars and to try to see everyone how God sees us.



Grief is hard. Death can impact all of life.

The Bereavement Journey comprises 7 sessions of films and discussion for anyone bereaved anytime.

The next course at Holy Trinity starts on Thursday evenings in March 2025: March 6, 13, 20 and 27, April 3 and 10 and concludes on Saturday morning 12 April.

To find out more please email: htsbereavementjourney@gmail.com Reverend Jon has helped us worship with sharing stories about forgiveness. We then asked Reverend Jon about how we actually forgive. The following week, Reverend Jon returned. He put weights into a backpack of a child in school whenever someone said something unkind. This represented the weight we carry when we are hurt. He then asked the child to do star jumps! The child found this very difficult with all the weight on his back. The weights were taken out the bag after each child who said the hurtful words sought forgiveness. Reverend Jon suggested the following pathway for us to forgive. We hope this helps you too.

Pathway to Forgiveness

 Admit that hurt!
Understand I'm not perfect either.
Holding on is not doing me any good
Ask Father God to help – you have forgiven me…help me now to forgive.
Practice forgiving and letting it go.

Year 6 Holy Trinity Spiritual Leaders



How long does it take after the death of someone close to you for life to...to what? Settle back down? Return to normal? (And how can it be normal?) For the loss not to be the all encompassing aspect of day and night?

Each of us will experience bereavement uniquely and yet there are common themes and issues. The Bereavement Journey gently unpacks these themes to give those attending an opportunity to reflect and explore the impact loss has had.

These topics include:

- Attachment, separation and loss
- The impact and pain of bereavement
- Anger and guilt
- Coping with others' reactions
- Adjusting to change
- Delayed and suppressed grief
- Moving forward healthily.

In a kind and supportive group that makes no demands, participants are able to consider their experience of bereavement and where they are on the journey. All are welcome whatever the passage of time since bereavement occurred.

What do you believe?

It's time to ask yourself what you believe.

Back in 1989, the film Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade culminated in the scene where his dad is deliberately shot, to force Indiana to face the last three challenges and find the fabled Holy Grail. The scene and the question have stayed with me, not least for the amazing optical illusion of the last challenge.

The question always comes to mind when I plan a confirmation course because it's an opportunity for everyone to explore questions and doubts about faith. What do you believe?

This Lent we shall widen the invitation to all who would like to take a deep dive into examining and exploring the heart of the Christian Faith and for some this might lead to confirmation.

Confirmation is a public declaration of faith confirming the promises made at baptism and becomes a wonderful celebration for those who want to take this step. *Please see page 9 in this magazine for details of when the courses will run.*

What a busy 2024 we had, and we are looking forward to the new year and hopefully a new hut.

As many of you know, we were able to announce that we had surpassed our fund-raising target of £100,000 in September, and were delighted to be able to add to this figure in October when Sunninghill and Ascot Parish Council committed £50,000 to the project. We are continuing to work closely with Sunningdale Parish Council and will submit our application in December – fingers crossed for more good news!

Although this is all really positive, with the cost of building supplies rising sharply since we started our fundraising in 2021, we realise we still have a long way to go to make our new hut a reality. Due to the escalating costs, we have decided to resubmit our planning application - to significantly refit the hut rather than rebuild from scratch. We hope to get this approved early in the New Year and get further financial support for our applications from external trusts.

Our equally popular Bike Sale in November raised nearly £1,000 from the sale of 70 bikes. Amazingly, we will soon be marking our 1,000th bike sold over the last 5 years. That's a lot of hours cleaning and fixing up pre-loved bikes while demonstrating our commitment to sustainability in the community.

We say a fond farewell, and a big thank you, to Andrea Williamson who has supported the Trustee Board for the last 3 years, but we welcome onboard Dominic Leigh and Omair Nazimi. Sadly for us, our current Trustee Board Chair, Micky King, will be stepping down in July 2025, and so we are looking for someone to take up the role. You do not need to have any connection with Scouts; having previous Trustee or business experience is a bonus, however the key to this role is enthusiasm.

Our **Beavers** spent most of this term adventuring outdoors on Scavenger hunts and learning about community impacts. They also had time to have fun with marbles, celebrated Diwali and will be enjoying epic Lego builds and dark games in the last couple of meetings.

Cubs had an awesome start to the Autumn term, with lots of exciting team building activities, learning about our local community and how to keep safe in the home. We also had some reptiles visit us, which was both scary and fascinating. The Cubs also visited the Grange to entertain the residents with some songs and sing alongs. They also learned about Remembrance Day, and have a Lego building competition and an Air Adventures camp, including a trip to Brooklands Museum, to look forward to.
